

Carthay Circle Neighborhood Association Update

Dear Neighbors,

The purpose of this newsletter is to update you on various matters impacting Carthay Circle:

ACS Security Patrol Services in Carthay Circle

ACS, the recommended security patrol service for the three Carthay communities, has informed us that it presently has about 175 subscribers in the three Carthay neighborhoods. Carthay Circle has 100 subscribers for the patrol service.

Carthay Circle in now being patrolled by 2 full time officers between the hours of 8 AM and midnight, with the last 4 hours being a rover that also assists nearby neighborhoods. ACS is also providing random checks during the other off hours.

The average response time for an alarm signal has been around 6 minutes. The yellow patrol car will vary in the number of times it comes down each street in any day depending on what calls are being responded to and what services the officer is providing. ACS estimates that a patrol vehicle is coming down each street at least 6 times per day.

Keep in mind that the officer in the patrol vehicle is only monitoring the homes of subscribers and will only enter onto the property of subscribers.

If you have not yet done so, we urge you to sign up for the ACS patrol service to improve the security and safety of your home and our neighborhood. The greater the number of Carthay Circle subscribers for ACS's patrol services the greater number of hours of dedicated patrol services that will be available in our neighborhood.

Postal Service

Earlier this year a committee was formed headed by CCNA Board Member Roger Grossman with the goal of rectifying the terrible postal service that Carthay Circle had been receiving.

I am very pleased to report that those efforts appear to have been effective and that the quality of postal service that Carthay Circle is now receiving has dramatically improved.

CONSTRUCTION OF THE METRO PURPLE LINE SUBWAY

As you know, currently there is extensive construction work involving moving the existing utilities on Wilshire Boulevard, east of La Cienega and around Fairfax Boulevards, to make room for the Metro Purple Line Subway Extension.

YOUR HPOZ

Remember --- we live in a HPOZ community which means that early on, before you undertake any changes to the outside of your home, including any changes to your front lawn or parkway you should consult with the HPOZ to understand what type of approvals, if any, you will need to obtain. In recent months one renovation was shut down for many weeks because of failure to comply with HPOZ approvals and another renovation was compelled to make costly changes because HPOZ approval was not sought.

ACADEMY MUSEUM of MOTION PICTURES

In June, the Los Angeles City Council unanimously voted to approve plans for the Academy Museum without dealing directly with the concerns expressed by the surrounding neighborhood associations regarding traffic, parking, noise and signage.

The nonprofit organization, Fix the City (<u>www.fixthecity.org</u>), brought a lawsuit against the project which was settled in September. In part, Fix the City explains the settlement agreement as follows:

"The settlement agreement ensures the Academy and Fix the City will work closely to minimize the Museum's impact on surrounding neighborhoods. Per the agreement, the Academy and Fix the City will monitor and, if necessary, enforce mutually agreed upon standards for a variety of factors, including traffic, parking, signage, and noise for the benefit of the community."

Despite the settlement there are still significant concerns regarding how the Museum will impact our neighborhood.

The residents north of San Vincente are greatly concerned about museum visitors parking on Warner, Del Valle and Barrows in the evenings and on weekends. As a result, a committee is being formed that will pursue seeking greater parking restrictions for those streets—including obtaining 24/7 restrictions if there is sufficient support. PLANT TREES on the PARKWAY in FRONT OF YOUR HOME

Studies have shown that trees in urban spaces have numerous and extraordinary beneficial consequences for the residents of the neighborhood -- they suppress noise, beautify streets, reduce stress and illness, reduce neighborhood crime, reduce wind speeds, remove air and ground water pollution, reduce carbon dioxide, reduce urban temperatures and meaningfully increase property values.

If you do not have trees planted on your parkway please consider planting one or more trees --- both you and our neighbors will greatly benefit from it. If you do have trees on your parkway, please preserve and maintain them—they are valuable assets.
